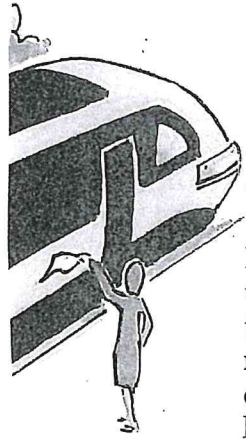

Fast food restaurants

Do you want a quick¹ meal? Then go to a fast food restaurant. There are now thousands of fast food restaurants in cities all around the world.

In England the restaurants open at ten o'clock in the morning and close at eleven o'clock at night. They are open every day of the week and every week of the year. But they close on 25th December, Christmas Day. All the restaurants serve the same food.

In London or New York, Paris or Madrid, people eat the same hamburgers, french fries² and apple pie³. And they drink the same drinks: coffee, Coca Cola, orange drink or milk shakes⁴.

In a fast food restaurant you don't sit at a table and look at a menu. You look at the price-list⁵ in the window or on the wall, and choose your meal. Then you go to the counter⁶ and give your order. You don't wait for your food. The staff⁷ behind the counter have special machines. They prepare the food very quickly, and put it in boxes, cups or bags⁸ for you to take away.

Getting around London

There are three ways to travel around London: the Underground or "tube", the taxi and the bus. The tube goes to practically every part of London. It is cheap¹ and quick, but perhaps a little too noisy for some. On the map of the tube each line has a different colour and often you have to change lines to reach your destination. The fare² can be bought from an automatic machine or at the ticket office.

If you feel like avoiding³ the crowds, taxis are reasonably cheap. The fare is recorded on the meter so that there is no doubt about it. The taxi-driver will probably talk about the weather and the heavy traffic. A tip⁴ of 10 per cent is customary.

One of the most famous English features is the double-decker bus. In London the buses are red, but the colours change in other towns. Fortunately, the bus service is well organised and buses run frequently.

For short journeys in London it is probably quicker than the tube. Most have a conductor⁵ to collect the fares, but in one-man buses the driver takes the fare as you enter. From the top of a double-decker you get a really good view of English town life. Both London buses and Underground trains are run⁶ by London Transport.
